


Enjoying social time before the AGM and banquet!

On May 23rd, members attended our AGM and banquet at the Brantford Golf and Country Club. We were introduced to a few of our scholarship winners and entertained by David MacLean, who spoke about "Our Home

Earlier in May, Denver H. and I attended the Ontario Council Conference and AGM held at the University of Ontario in Oshawa. There was a leadership workshop entitled "Bringing your club into the 21st century" which I was very interested in attending. Unfortunately, it was held on the Friday at 6:00 pm. As we couldn't leave Brantford until Denver finished work at 6:00 pm, we were unable to attend this one. However, as Denver used instagram to post about the Keynote speaker, and as CFUW Brantford saved the day for one of the workshop presenters (I provided both the adaptor and the computer as her presentation was incompatible with the technology of the university, and Denver became the AV technician, up at the front of the workshop allowing the presenter to project her video, turning on the speakers etc.), I realized that CFUW Brantford may be ahead of the crowd on this 21st Century stuff!

We did get to Oshawa in time for the lovely reception at the Robert McLaughlin Art Gallery. We were treated to an excellent vocal performance by a choir from one of the local high schools. They sang a great version of the "Log Driver's Waltz" which has long been one of my favourite Canadian folk songs. After the performance, we toured the gallery and enjoyed the exhibits.

There was one section about the appropriation of indigenous culture in advertising that was particularly provoking. The artist used collages and older print advertising to show product names that originally came from indigenous languages. To us, the word now means only "a big truck" or "a cigarette", and we don't even realize that it comes from another language and has another meaning.

On Saturday morning, we attended the AGM. It was interesting to hear what other clubs have done and are doing, particularly in the area of advocacy. After the meeting, we heard from the Keynote Speaker, Dr. Imogen R. Coe, who spoke on "Embedding Equity, Delivering Diversity, Saving Science". She was a very engaging speaker with powerful stories, statistics and images. She talked about how diversity drives creativity and leads to greater innovation which, in turn, leads to economic development. Canada, due to the make-up of our society, has great opportunity for diversity in science, but there are still road blocks. We need to examine our cultural biases and continue to work towards equity and inclusion. Her talk was the highlight of the conference for me.

After lunch, we attended 2 workshops. The first was by a forensic artist who has helped law enforcement solve numerous missing persons cases. The second was a tour of the wind tunnel facility of the university. Not only do they work with wind, but they can also create simulations of turbulence, rain, ice and sun, or any combination of these. The facilities are used in all kinds of interesting ways. For example, first responders learn to do CPR in a moving vehicle on a bumpy road, firefighters learn how to work in extreme weather conditions and tests are conducted to determine how working in such extreme conditions affects their decision making skills. It is a fascinating facility.

And that brings my inaugural year to a close! In the fall, I will be doing some travelling (my long post-poned honeymoon). Tish and Patti will be taking over the reins for September and October. News from National

The 2018 AGM will take place on June 23, 2018, electronically. Anyone who is interested in "attending" is able to do so. As previously stated by Penelope, you can watch with other members, or on your own. Please reference Penelope's email of May 29, 2018 for details.

There are two issues that will be discussed at the AGM which may be of interest to club members: Resolutions & Amendments to the articles and by-laws.

There have been some amendments to the resolutions since they were reviewed by the club. A short summary of the changes is as follows:

- 1. The resolution with respect to Ending Youth Homelessness has been broadened. The amendments while still urging various levels of government to implement programs, calls for the federal government to provide sufficient funding & support communities and organizations that have researched and developed strategies to address this issue;
- 2. The Fair and Non-Discriminatory Management of Refugees and Asylum Seekers resolution has been amended to call upon the federal government to take urgent action and to suspend (not repeal) the Canada/US Safe Third Country Agreement;
- 3. The Equitable access to provincial curricula and social justice education for all children resolution now includes a term that the appropriate level of government review discrepancies as between different jurisdictions in respect of home schooling programs in addition to the initial call for policy development and oversight.

The changes proposed to the articles and by-laws contain various proposed changes, mostly related to terms of office, but they are a worthy mention. There is a proposal that would amend Bylaw 15 such that dues shall be payable at the revised rate at the beginning of the CFUW fiscal year following the fiscal year in which the change was approved. The amendment is the addition of "at the beginning of". Anyone interested in reading all the proposed amendments can find then on the CFUW national website.
