CFUW's 100th Anniversary AGM 2019 in Winnipeg

The Official opening of the AGM will be at 5 pm Thursday, August 15, 2019 and will be followed by a day titled <u>Celebrating CFUW's History and Future</u>. The business meeting will commence mid-afternoon Friday August 16, 2019 and will continue into Saturday August 17, 2019 until approximately 4:00 p.m. Friday night there will be a gala banquet.

her goal is to graduate and obtain full time employment. Through her community involvement and temporary fulltime work, she has overcome many barriers and is on the road to success.

The Monday Night Book Club met to discuss the novel "The Alice Network" by Kate Quinn. The group agreed that the historical facts regarding the women spies of WW1 made the novel an interesting and entertaining read. The novel also led to more research on the women involved in this dangerous and often unrewarded work. The novel wove together the story of a young socialite in 1947 who, while searching for her beloved cousin who was lost during the war, encounters one of the women who acted as a spy and through her story is able to piece together the misfortunes of war. The Thursday Book Club read and discussed Lisa See's novel "The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane". The book, set in 20th Century China, is a tale about tea, about family and identity, about mother daughter relationships, and about the story of a society (the Akha, a Chinese ethnic minority) confronted with the forces of modernity. The author relies upon the concept of "no coincidence, no story" to successfully link these various aspects. Lisa See, a fifth generation Chinese American herself, examines what it means to be Chinese and the stresses of belonging to two cultures. She has deeply researched both the global tea trade and skilfully describes through her characters the affect of history and politics on the lives of those who grew and sold tea.


Both groups agreed that this novel deserves the label "recommended reading". (You will have to read the book to get more of the story details...enjoy, Rhynda)
