On Tuesday, October 15th, CFUW Brantford held an "interesting" All Candidates Night for the 2019 Federal Election which occurred

on October 21st. The event, sponsored by RTO District 40, was well attended by CFUW members, RTO members and other members of the public and all candidates were present...at least at the beginning: Phil McColeman (Conservative), Bob Jonkman (Green), Leslie Bory (Independent), John Turmel (Independent), Danielle Takacs (Liberal), Sabrina Sawyer (NDP), Dave Wrobel (People's Party of Canada) and Jeff Gallagher (Veterans Coalition Party of Canada). Anne Martin did an excellent job of moderating the event. Many members volunteered to help out in advance and on the night of the

event. Candidates were invited, a team formulated questions concerning topics of concern to CFUW and RTO, publicity was arranged, supplies were gathered, guests were greeted and the evening managed.

The Gord Paynter Theatre at North Park Collegiate proved to be an excellent venue with its 200-seat capacity, excellent acoustics, comfortable seats, accessi-

bility, generous parking and reasonable price. Principal Susan Noort gave assistance in advance and teacher Alex Bromke worked the sound system.

warning and then if there was a repetition, the offending party would be told to leave. Comments were made, Anne Martin, as moderator, issued a warning and Phil McColeman walked out of the event in protest over comments made and over the process we decided to follow. The remaining seven candidates continued and there was no repeat of the offensive comments. There was, however, some ranting, raving and generally uninformed statements, but the candidates followed the time limits and acted in a civilized manner toward others on the platform.

We had a full house and covered many different topics but I would have to say that I was feeling somewhat discouraged about the outcome of the evening. Although we have tried to be inclusive, if we run another event in the future, we might want to consider inviting vetted candidates who represent national parties with actual platforms.
