News from National

Resolutions Update:

As the proposed resolutions were set out in detail in the last newsletter, I shall just set out the outcome of the club's direction to our delegates at the Ontario and National Annual Meetings. Our club has voted to support the Ontario Council resolution calling for educating Ontario students yearly, respecting the awareness, prevention, and detection of human trafficking. With respect to resolutions from National, our club has voted to support the resolutions put forward to ban single use plastics, to call on the government to take steps to address the opioid crisis; and to urge the Federal Government of Canada to develop a comprehensive Post-Pandemic Economic Recovery Plan including specific interventions to address the disparate effect of pandemics on the lives of women. The proposed resolution respecting the right to repair large household appliances was rejected.

The Report from the Independent COVID-19 Long-Term Care Commission

The long-awaited Report from the Independent Long-Term Care COVID-19 Commission is now available! Since COVID-19 began over a year ago, nearly 4000 residents in Ontario have died in LTC homes as well as staff. After the first wave, recommendations were made to the government regarding staff, PPE, and infection control measures but the government did not act. As a result, there were more deaths from the second wave of COVID-19 than the first! We now have the Report from the commissioners, who should be congratulated for listening to the more than 700 persons interviewed, because they got it! The problems in LTC homes have been years in the making. COVID-19 exacerbated all the failings that we knew were there! The commissioners made 85 recommendations covering all aspects of LTC but the quote that stands out is "Leaders at every level must put their hearts, as well as their minds, into reimagining the care of the elderly in this province. This will require a philosophy of care that is anchored in respect, compassion and kindness for the people who live and work in long-term care. It is not just about building more homes. There needs to be a transformation to a person-centered care model, which motivates different behaviours and rewards innovation that leads to better outcomes for residents and

staff." (<u>Ontario's Long-Term Care COVID-19 Commission -</u> Home (Itccommission-commissionsld.ca)

The 85 recommendations dealt with pandemic preparedness, infection prevention and control, health care system integration, resident-focused care and quality of life, human resource challenges, funding, long-term care home development, increased accountability and transparency and enforcement. The Report provided a path forward to prevent this tragedy from happening again.

The commissioners said, "It is time to stop studying the problems with long-term care and begin implementing comprehensive change." What is needed now is the government to act! Leaders at every level need to step up and make a commitment to make sure that the recommendations of this Report are carried out. Our residents, families and staff in longterm care deserve nothing less.

"Philomena meets *Orphan Train* in this suspenseful, provocative novel filled with love, secrets, and deceit—the story of a


young unwed mother who is forcibly separated from her daughter at birth and the lengths to which they go to find each other".


