proud grandmother to Spenser, Mel, Léa, Kristopher, and Sera. Melodie loved travel, and she and Marvin enjoyed many adventures together. As a coordinator for a student exchange program, she placed and hosted exchange students from different countries, many of whom became lifelong friends. She loved reading, and that love inspired her to become an English teacher, and later to open the Brantford Bookworm. She was a devoted member of University Women's Club and the BCI Alumni Association. Melodie adored music and played piano beautifully; she was accompanist for the BCI Glee Club during her high school years. She took enormous joy and pride in her children and grandchildren's musical accomplishments and was a familiar face at the Kiwanis Music Festival. Hats Off to Volunteering

On behalf of the membership, a Nominations Committee is formed every year to perform an important task — to identify who is willing to sit on the Executive for the coming year. We were delighted to learn that the President in Name, the Presidents for the Month, the Treasurer, the Secretary, and the Chairs of Communications, Membership and Social all volunteered to stay on for another term. Pretty soon two people agreed to work together to be the Co-Chairs, one pair to head up Program and the other pair to chair Scholarship. In addition, a member volunteered to Chair the Interest Groups. In our conversations with people, we were heartened to learn that the people who chair the individual interest groups have either volunteered to continue for next year or have found replacements. We also heard from quite a few people that they were prepared to work on committees or projects such as the All-Candidates Meeting should we decide to organize an evening for the upcoming election. The Nominations Committee has two more positions to fill, Past President and Chair of Advocacy. Ideally, the Past President knows about Roberts Rules of Order, the meeting management process that CFUWs use across Canada, and sits on the Scholarship Committee. The Chair of Advocacy needs to strike a committee each Spring to review the resolutions sent to us from National on behalf of clubs across Canada. Ideally, the Advocacy Chair would form a committee that would also review local, provincial (Ontario Council) and National issues and suggest action to the membership. The Nominations Committee would like to thank all the members who had conversations with us regarding the roles for 2022-23, for those who agreed to chair, and for those who said they would be happy to provide helping hands. Dining Out Group: The Mush Hole

On March 30th, nineteen of us - the Dining Out Group and friends attended a performance of *The Mush Hole* at the Sanderson Centre. Our group had not met for two years and decided to start up again with a theatre performance.

Based on the traumatic testimonials of two generations of Survivors, Santee Smith, Founding and Managing Artistic Director created this profoundly moving interpretive dance. that was performed by the Kaha:wi Dancers. The all-Indigenous cast, along with the cinematic imagery and musical score, catapult audiences into the residential experience.

Most of us were familiar with the Mohawk Institute - the residential school that sits beside current-day Woodland Cultural Centre. We knew that it is the oldest operating school, running from 1828 to 1970. We knew that it was mandated by the Government and operated by churches for the purpose of assimilating children from Six Nations and surrounding Nations into Euro-Christian society and sever the child from Native Culture, Family, and Language. Many of us had attended lectures and read books and knew that some of the children had been subjected to abuse. We even knew that the children called the Mohawk Institute "The Mush Hole" because they were fed oatmeal that was laden with maggots. But this performance - like all fine art - was a visceral experience, and it had a profound impact on us, and has fundamentally deepened our understanding of the impact that the residential school had on the children and their families. The consensus was that this very heavy experience was profound and impactful; and we highly encourage everyone who has not yet seen it, to attend The Mush Hole when they have the opportunity in the future. As Lily uncovers more about Odile's mysterious past, she finds they share a love of language, the same longings and the same intense jealousy. As Odile and Lily become friends, we learn more about Odile's regrets from wartime, being careful to guide Lily away from the same mistakes that have haunted her since the war. Roma M.
